We use this book as a choice in a book club, with a theme centered around civil rights. It teaches about segregation and the importance of racial equality, but also shows how oppressed people have important stories to tell. Since the setting of the book is situated during the 1960s in the southern U.S. during the Civil Rights Movement, there are some scenes of hate crimes and racist language is used. We will have discussions addressing these topics, along with other positive themes the book captures.
