 A teen wakes up in a clearing in the center of a gigantic maze with no memory of his past, finding himself a resident in a community of boys who have built a village in the glade and who sends two of its strongest and fittest runners into the maze every morning to find a way out.

Potentially Objectionable Content (list all categories and at least one example, referenced with a page or chapter number)

Language: Many made-up slang words, such as "klunk" and "slinthead"; the word "shuck" Ex on page 19. Some usage of the words "butt," "crappy," and "sucks." example on page 65.

Violence: Many instances of violence as the plot surrounds characters who are in mortal danger, including attacks on monsters with guns, knives on monsters. Example on page 73

<u>Trauma-</u> Many scenes depict characters in fear for their life. Example: one boy thinks he is going insane. p35

Rationale for the Literature Selection (in addition to standards): Maze Runner will be a choice in literature circles in our 8th grade dystopian unit. Dystopian literature is used to present a vision of the future that challenges readers to reflect on the current social and political environments in which they live. Maze Runner is a high quality choice because it pulls readers in with the mysterious characters and holds their attention because of the twist on the scifi dystopian society with edge-of-your-seat storylines. Many different themes are developed throughout the novel allowing for all students to make connections, and have great conversations. For example, the idea that the protagonist is most successful when working with others relates to topics such as teamwork, working with challenging people, and perseverance. These are qualities that middle school students can emulate as a result of their engagement with Maze Runner.
